PUBLIC POLICY REPORT, Wanda Nelson

AAUW is mobilizing a movement to close the gender pay gap—and the national office is counting on us to help. "Work Smart" is a program that's empowering women across the country to negotiate for a raise, promotion, or a new job.

"Work Smart" is a free, on-line, one-hour course to teach women essential negotiation skills and important facts about the status of the gender pay gap. Nearly all participants who take the "Work Smart" course report having more confidence and better negotiating skills.

AAUW is asking every member to share the course information with their friends and family members on social media via Facebook or Twitter. The "Members Mobilize a Million" challenge plans to reach a first phase goal of training **1 million women.** One hour of online learning can lead to a lifetime of higher earnings.

This work considers how government transfers affect pre- and post-separation economic well-being and seeks to inform policies intended to support separated women.

- The minutes of September 25 were approved as printed in the *Scope*.
- Linda Voss is still requesting help with the Membership Chair duties.
- Ellie Beck explained briefly what the Odyssey Project is and requested contributions for our month to support a meal for the participants scheduled on Nov. 28. You can also bring something for that meal to our next meeting on the 27th of Nov. An envelope was passed around for contributions.
- Finance Officer Gail Stirr provided a financial update with a current balance of \$4170.39.
- Public Policy Chair Wanda Nelson reported that the AAUW National Office is encouraging everyone to participate in the Facebook share project "Work Smart" to help close the pay gap between men and women for the same job.
- The international AAUW scholarship student from Columbia has been invited to the December luncheon.
- Fundraising Co-Chair Mary Zins reported that we will be attending the APT performance of *Engaging Shaw* on Nov. 15. Ten people have registered, but we encourage more participation. We will be car pooling, the cost has been reduced to \$60, and we will be stopping for lunch in Spring Green. The deadline to sign up is Friday, Oct. 26.
- Our annual silent auction will be held at our December Holiday Luncheon. Mary Berg suggested that members bring items to our next meeting in Nov. or bring them by 10:30 am on the day of the event, Dec. 1. Reta Harring is collecting payment for the luncheon as well as

- Bobbi White and Donna Anderson are attending the first of two Start Smart workshops on the UW campus tonight. These are designed to help young women negotiate salaries comparable to men when they begin their careers. At the Board meeting, Donna presented an itemized list for workbooks and snacks for the two workshops which are budgeted for this year. UW is paying the National AAUW \$1500 for a three year contract to support these efforts.
- There is also a relatively new effort to organize a campus group of young AAUW members. These young women are enthusiastic with ideas for fundraising as well as planning a "Destress Day" around exam preparation time doing arts and crafts and inviting potential new members. They are also planning participation in the February Organization Fair on campus to attract new members.
- The Board moved that we have a line item in our budget next year for the Start Smart program and a line item in our budget next year for the UW student group if needed.
