WOMEN'S HISTORY, Mary Boyd & Bobbi White

The Long Fight for the Right to Vote-The 19th Amendment (1848-1920) The United States has existed as a nation for not quite 250 years. Yet, women have been able to vote for the laws of this nation for only 100 of those years (1920-2020). The process to gain that right was long, involving many persons. A few are relatively well known but many more labored for many years in obscurity. It began in earnest in 1848 when 200 women led by Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Lucretia Mott met in Seneca Falls, NY to discuss women's rights including the right to vote. Then, beginning in 1850, yearly conventions were held to further those efforts. After the 15th Amendment passed granting African American men the right to vote, Congress refused to expand that right to women. In 1869, the National American Women's Suffrage Association (NAWSA) was formed by Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton to push for women's suffrage. It became the League of Women Voters after 1920 when the vote was finally won. Another organization, the American Woman Suffrage Association led by Lucy Stone was formed in the same year to work through state legislatures. This became extremely important in increasing support for women's suffrage. In 1890, the two groups combined. That same year, Wyoming became the first state to grant women the right to vote. By 1912 Colorado, Utah, Idaho, Washington, California, Oregon, Arizona and Kansas also granted women the vote in large part to attract women to come to live in those western states. From 1913 until 1918 the fight for suffrage bogged down and as a result became more radicalized, led by a young woman named Alice Paul and her supporters. When Congress refused to take up legislation for suffrage, she and her followers led marches, picketed Congressional leaders, were jailed repeatedly, and physically attacked. Finally, at the end of WWI (1918), after women had greatly aided the war effort, opposition to suffrage decreased and 15 states had, by then, granted women suffrage. In addition, Great Britain, Germany and Russia had already extended the right to vote to women which the suffrage leaders continually pointed out.

In January 1918, the House of Representatives passed the woman suffrage amendment with the necessary two-thirds vote. It took the more conservative Senate until June of 1919 to pass the amendment. It was then up to three-fourths of state legislatures (36) to ratify the amendment before it became part of our Constitution. Wisconsin became the first state legislature to ratify the amendment and Tennessee became the 36th legislature to vote (by 1 vote) for ratification in August, 2020. Eleven states either voted against the amendment or refused to even take a vote. Without that 1 Tennessee vote from Harry Burns who changed his vote from no to yes at the request of his mother, the ratification would have failed and the process would have had to start again! Great Decisions Discussion Group, Mary Boyd

If you are new to our branch or are unfamiliar with this group, consider joining us this coming winter and early spring.

Each year the <u>Foreign Policy Association</u>, New York, N.Y publishes a booklet covering 8 current world policy topics researched and written by knowledgeable professionals. Accompanying questions and a supplemental reading list is provided for each topic. The purpose is to provide information for individuals to become better informed and for groups to better discuss these topics. An opportunity to respond to the F. P Assoc. with on-line opinion polling is available following each discussion.

For a number of years the Monona/Madison AAUW branch has organized a group of members who have met to discuss each of the topics. We typically start meeting in late January, usually every two weeks. However, as of now, the plan would likely be to meet via ZOOM. Cost is \$28 for the book-same as last year (This book is necessary and contains the primary information for each topic.) In addition to the book, there has been a DVD to provide additional information at the on-site meetings. I am expecting to get information of its availability using Vimeo (on-line) at a cost to each of us of \$2-\$3. This has not been finalized as of yet.
