WOMEN'S HISTORY, Mary Boyd & Bobbi White

Georgia O'Keeffe, 11/15/1887-3/6/1986. In her large scale flower paintings, Georgia O'Keeffe created representational art that at the same time appeared abstract, making her reputation as the most important female artist in the United States and the "Mother of American Modernism."



Born in Sun Prairie in 1887, she studied at the Art Institute of Chicago and the Art Students' League of New York. While teaching art in Texas she met famed photographer Alfred Stieglitz (whom she later married), and he exhibited her work in his famous New York gallery, marking a turning point in her career.

She is noted primarily for her large-scale painting, Petunia 2, and others while working with other modernists in New Mexico. After her husband's death, she settled in New Mexico, often meeting there with fellow artist Frida Kahlo.

Her later paintings included visions of sky elements and clouds. The Georgia O'Keeffe Museum was established in Santa Fe and holds over 140 oil paintings, nearly 700 drawings, and hundreds of works from her life. One of the most significant female artists of the 20th century, Georgia O'Keeffe was committed to creating imagery that portrayed what she called "the wildness and wonder of the word as I live in it." Another hometown woman who changed the world!

You will learn of the protest jailings, victories, and defeats culminating with the signature of President Woodrow Wilson that would forever give women the right to vote."

Great Decisions Discussion Group, Mary Boyd

If you are new to our branch or are unfamiliar with this group, consider joining us this coming winter and early spring.

Each year the <u>Foreign Policy Association</u>, New York, N.Y publishes a booklet covering 8 current world policy topics researched and written by knowledgeable professionals. Accompanying questions and a supplemental reading list is provided for each topic. The purpose is to provide information for individuals to become better informed and for groups to better discuss these topics. An opportunity to respond to the F. P Assoc. with on-line opinion polling is available following each discussion.

For a number of years the Monona/Madison AAUW branch has organized a group of members who have met to discuss each of the topics. We typically start meeting in late January, usually every two weeks. However, as of now, the plan would likely be to meet via ZOOM. Cost is \$28 for the book-same as last year (This book is necessary and contains the primary information for each topic.) In addition to the book, there has been a DVD to provide additional information at the on-site meetings. I am expecting to get information of its availability using Vimeo (on-line) at a cost to each of us of \$2-\$3. This has not been finalized as of yet.
