Join the League of Women Voters of Dane County for this forum as we explore the win-win aspects of Wisconsin's alternative energy transition. Wisconsin's aging energy systems send approximately \$14.4 billion out of our state each year to purchase fossil fuels. That money can be redirected for instate use when WI shifts to renewable energy sources and efficiency upgrades. But WI taxpayers will benefit most if the multi-pronged transition is designed to ensure a win-win outcome for all rather than a "winner take all." Guest speakers will sketch out our energy transformation from a full palette of possibilities, addressing key questions: What are the barriers to progress? Who is training the workforce for clean energy jobs? What's in it for rural communities? How can we ensure benefits are shared evenhandedly by all and protect our natural world? And how do system-wide energy efficiencies get buy-in from local governments and consumers?

Speakers:

Sam Dunaiski is the Distributed Renewable Energy Program Director for RENEW Wisconsin. Sam manages all of RENEW's solar-energy programs and conducts policy analysis on non-utility sources of renewable energy. Before joining RENEW, Sam was an operational meteorologist, creating weather forecasts for airports, utilities, and the media.

Scott Coenen is the Executive Director of the Wisconsin Conservative Energy Forum (WICEF), a non-profit organization that launched in fall 2017. Previously Scott worked in the Wisconsin State Capitol on the legislature's Joint Committee on Finance, gaining valuable policy writing experience. Selected as one of the 2019 recipients of Midwest Energy News 40 Under 40 leaders in the clean energy economy, Scott is dedicated to educating and informing conservative leaders on an "all of the above" energy strategy that includes emerging clean technologies and advancing a conservative, pragmatic vision of a renewable energy future.

WOMEN'S HISTORY, Bobbie White & Mary Boyd

Women Who Changed The World: Mary Leakey, February 6-1913 - December 9, 1996. Mary Leakey was a paleo-anthropologist who was the first person to discover a Proconsul skull and footprints to show that our ancestors had walked upright. She and her team gave scientists a first glimpse of the time scales of this evolutionary stage.

In 1978, Mary Leakey and her team came across what was to become one of the most important sets of footprints ever found. They belonged to two individuals who walked over the wet volcanic ash at a site near Laetoli, Tanzania some 3.5 million years before. For the first time, the footprints showed that human ancestors (known as Australopithecus) had walked upright using a perfect two-footed stride with no knuckle prints that would have suggested the use of all four limbs.

Before this discovery, no one had a definitive time scale for when human ancestors might have evolved from four legs to two legs to walk around. The prints showed the characteristically human arch in the foot and did not have the same large big toe that other apes have. The footprints were not damaged because they had been covered in powdery ash. This was then cemented over by soft rain, making a perfect imprint that would not be destroyed over a million years.

Information from theft print and the length of pace suggested that the two hominids would have been about 4 feet 7 inches and 3 feet 1 inches tall. The Laetoli site is located about 28 miles from another archeological site, Olduvai Gorge, where many human tools and skeletons have been found over the years including those of Homo habilis.

Mary Leakey, with her husband, Louis, and their son, Richard, carried out significant research in the field of archeology.

Author's Note: I was privileged to actually visit the site at Olduvai Gorge on my trip to Tanzania. It is very impressive and you can witness the continual excavations from various world universities while standing on top of the gorge which was created by the retreat of a massive river much like the Colorado River scraped out our own Grand Canyon.
