7:00 p.m. Zoom Program: George Penn from Wisconsin United to Amend will present on: "Let's Fix This! How you help get big money out of politics." George Penn grew up in NY and moved to Madison in 1977 to get a degree in Nuclear Engineering. He spent most of his career as an Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy Consultant. In 2012 he shut down his business to devote his "free years" to Restoring our Republic from the corrupt political system. He joined United to Amend in 2012 and is helping to grow the movement around the state and nation. He expects to be building this non-partisan, grassroots movement until he is unable. Wisconsin United to Amend is an all-volunteer group that has helped pass referendums/resolutions supporting amending the constitution to get big money out of politics in 166 Wisconsin counties, cities, villages and towns. Twenty-two states have signed on supporting a constitutional amendment (but not Wisconsin, yet).

The Branch Business Meeting will follow the program, which will include the election of branch officers.

STEM:In other good news, I want to let you know that the Tech Savy weekend education program for middle school girls went well this year for the Janesville and Fort Atkinson Branches. Even though they had to switch it from an in person event to online they had 119 participants out of 120 possible slots. Fifty schools across the State were represented. Some were as far away as Green Bay. The event took a lot of work and coordination with help from UW Whitewater students and staff. Thank you to all of our members who reached out to our local school districts to inform them of this opportunity. It is hoped that in the coming year the Monona/Madison Branch can lend a hand in the events of the future.

NATIONAL BYLAW CHANGE VOTE, Kleo Baruth Kritz

This is an important year with changes to AAUW National bylaws to eliminate the degree requirement for membership. Many branches are actively promoting this change. The vote goes from April 7-May 17. Just go to the National Website and type in "Bylaws" where the magnifying glass search box is at the top of the homepage and it will pop up. The articles explaining the reasoning was sent to members before the February meeting.

AAUW Bylaws Amendment Between April 7th and May 17th, all AAUW members will have the opportunity to vote on an important bylaws amendment that will **eliminate the degree requirement for membership in AAUW**. The AAUW Board of Directors and the AAUW Governance Committee give the following rationale for the proposed the amendment:

"AAUW's mission is to advance gender equity, yet the requirement for membership explicitly denies access to membership to those without college degrees. AAUW does not promote equity for all women and girls if the organization maintains exclusionary membership requirements. The membership requirement is not fair, is not right, and is not equity. This is simply the right thing to do."

This proposed amendment is strongly supported by the national organization and our state organization. **QUESTION**: AAUW has been this way for a long time. Why do we need to change now?

Our continued relevance will be enhanced by eliminating barriers that limit who can participate in our mission of advancing equity for women and girls.

Staying relevant is crucial to AAUW's survival. We will have access to more funding from corporate and foundation funders, which is critical. Many will not fund organizations that have barriers to participation in the work of the organization.

Membership dues only fund a small portion of our work. Our self-imposed degree requirement actually discriminates against women and girls, even if it once was a wellintentioned incentive to specific achievement. **Bottom line**. If the degree requirement is eliminated, membership in AAUW will be based on support for our mission to advance equity for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy, not on whether someone individually has had the opportunity, time, or money to attend college. I hope you will take the time to carefully consider this significant amendment. Frequently Asked Questions about the Open Membership Bylaws Amendment

1. AAUW has been this way for a long time. Why do we need to change now? Our continued relevance will be enhanced by eliminating barriers that limit who can participate in our mission of advancing equity for women and girls. Staying relevant is crucial to continued success. We will have access to more funding from corporate and foundation funders. Many won't fund organizations that have barriers to participation in the work of the organization. Membership dues only fund a small portion of our work. We need to recognize that our self-imposed degree requirement actually discriminates against women and girls, even if it once was a well-intentioned incentive to specific achievement.

2. Won't dropping the degree requirement end what is unique about our organization and our like-minded nature? Our mission is not changing and AAUW will continue to be unique in its breadth of programming, research, policy, and advocacy, our fully endowed fellowships & grants for higher education, and our grassroots membership. Having a degree does not make someone "like-minded" or a better advocate. We are like-minded in our support for advancing equity for women and girls. Women without degrees can be passionate advocates. Think Eleanor Roosevelt, Lilly Ledbetter, Malala, Greta Thunburg.

3. Don't we need to honor our founding mothers by retaining the degree requirement? Today, more women earn degrees than men, and we make up (pre- COVID) almost half of the U.S. workforce. But economic disparities and discrimination against women persist widely, despite our levels of education and workforce participation. College degrees don't guarantee equal treatment or opportunities for women. Equal treatment and opportunity were foundational values for our founders.

4. If the degree requirement is dropped, will branch membership increase? Many younger women and men view our degree requirement as elitist and discriminatory. Eliminating it may help increase their support for our mission whether as national or branch members, donors, or advocates. But young people tend to avoid meetings in favor of taking on projects; they may also be deterred from joining a branch by the age of most of our current branch members. More women in older age ranges may be interested in joining branches once the degree barrier is removed. We all have friends

who can't be members because of the current degree requirement, and many of us have been embarrassed by encouraging friends to join, only to find out they aren't eligible.

5. I'm proud of my degree. We should still encourage women to get their degrees! We won't stop encouraging women to get degrees. But degrees are not the "badge of honor" they once were and many careers are now open to women without them. Skyrocketing educational costs, childcare, elder care, transportation, working multiple jobs, and language barriers are significant issues limiting opportunities to get a degree. Also, women are now burdened with two-thirds of the national college debt. Cost is a barrier many of us didn't have "back then." Education can come in many forms.

6. Won't we have to change our name if we drop the degree requirement? No. We can just use our initials, ala the YMCA or NAACP, to name two organizations that don't spell out their full names any longer. Changing our name is not the issue to focus on. Our focus needs to be on staying relevant, increasing our ability to get funding, and opening our membership to a broader group that will work in support of the mission.

WOMEN"S HISTORY, Mary Boyd & Bobbi White Jocelyn Bell Burnell, Astrophysicist

Jocelyn Bell Burnell was born in Northern Ireland on July 15, 1943.

She was studying at Cambridge University in England in 1967 under the guidance of Anthony Hewish when she discovered a regular pulsing radio transmission emanating from outer space; jokingly, she labeled it "Little Green Men" on charts.



Bell had joined Arthur Hewish's research team after completing a physics degree at Glasgow University in 1965, helping to build a massiveradio telescope to study quasars while studying for her PhD in 1967. She soon noticed a series of repeating radio emissions on the printouts, occurring just over once every second - too frequent to be from a quasar. The team realized these emissions must be coming from rapidly spinning celestial corpses called neutron stars - the collapsed remnants of a dead star.

Later it was discovered to be a radio pulsar - a fast spinning collapsed star - and Hewish's team published their findings in a scientific paper. Discovery turned into controversy , however, as Hewish and co-authors later won the Nobel Prize to the exclusion of Jocelyn Bell, a decision debated ever since.

The discovery prompted a flurry of media attention and the discovery of more pulsars; Bell earned her PhD in 1968. In 1974 the Nobel committee awarded Hewish and other researcher, Ryle, leaving out Bell, a move that angered cosmologist Fred Hoyle. Bell remained unconcerned, however, and went on to study astronomy at various U.K. institutions. Her work is remembered as an important discovery in the modern description of our Universe, later acting as further evidence for the existence of black holes.

Jocelyn Bell Burnell continued lecturing at several British institutions; she was created Commander of the Order of the British Empire (CBE) in 1999 and Dame (DBE) in 2007. Bell Burnell became a member of the Royal Society in 2003, and also served as president of the Royal Astronomical Society (2002–04) and as president of the Institute of Physics in 2008. *Perseverance* is on Mars today due to space contributions from women like Jocelyn Bell Burnell.

AAUW GENERAL MEETING MINUTES, March 23, 2021

Meeting called to order by Sally Keyel, Co-President via Zoom. 28 members plus the guest speaker participated.

The minutes of the February 23, 2021 meeting were approved with the following corrections: Tax deductible amount for dues is \$59. (not \$56) and the following policy changes: Policy 3: Each member is encouraged to serve at a general meeting, the summer program, or a luncheon, or contribute a like amount towards expenses.

Policy 9: A detailed report of any special activity should be prepared by the Chair for the files. This report should include names of committee members. The committee members are responsible for any purchases they make except for any funds approved by the board. This file should be passed on to the new office holder or the President.
