Program, 7 p.m.: Celebrate the 50th Year Anniversary

of IX (1972—2022)

Title IX is arguably one of the most important pieces of federal education legislation to focus on individual rights based on sex. Our speakers will update us on the history of Title IX and focus on educational achievement at the university level in the areas of athletics and progress in reducing sexual harassment and assault. Our speakers are Nona Gronert and Katie Ahrens Smith.

Nona Gronert is a PhD Candidate in Sociology at the University of Wisconsin—Madison. She is also affiliated



with UW-Madison's Sexual Violence Research Initiative and is a 2021 National Academy of Education/Spencer Dissertation Fellow. Gronert's research focuses on sexual violence (i.e. sexual harassment and sexual assault) in higher education. Her dissertation uses a historical case study of one university to explore how strategies to address sexual violence are institutionalized, and how Title IX implementation has become part of student expectations, university structures, and administrators' careers. She personally became interested in Title IX and sexual violence during her time as an undergraduate at Occidental College, one of the colleges featured in The Hunting Ground a documentary about sexual assault in higher education. Katie Ahrens Smith –Sr. Associate Athletic Director and Senior Woman Administrator at the University of Wisconsin—Madison. She oversees UW's compliance office and is Deputy Title IX Coordinator. She also serves as sport administrator for women's volleyball and co-sport administrator for football. Prior to these assignments, she spent 21 years in UW's compliance office beginning in 1998 and has served in various compliance roles overseeing all facets of the office prior to her promotion to Director of Compliance in 2010. The focus of her talk will be Title IX as it stands in 2022, how it has changed, and the challenges it faces in the evolving world of college athletics.

NATIONAL AAUW HAS A NEW WEBSITE, Kleo Baruth Kritz

National AAUW briefly closed their website and has now reopened it with major changes. Your email will now be your username (not your ID number) and you will need to set up a new password. There are definite glitches right now but these are the steps to follow:

- 1. Log in to National website https://www.aauw.org
- 2. A box will show up and say "Password Reset Required" and type in your email
- 3. Go to bottom and tap "Forgot your Password?"
- 4. Then new box "Reset your Password" shows up and type in your email again
- 5. Then tap the big blue box that says "Reset your password"
- 6. A green notice will appear at top of page that says if this is a valid user email you will get an email from National for the reset and all is well.

This is **what should happen** and does for most people if you are lucky! However, it took me over a dozen tries over three days, which produced no return reset email from National, and there were other State Board members who also had similar issues.

If not getting a password reset email back, send an email to memberinfo@email.aauw.org and ask for a password reset. It took over 24 hours for it to finally come through. I suspect National is being overwhelmed right now.

Note for branch officers: This website is a work-in-process and by no means finished. As of now we cannot get into our database of the branch roster or listing of officers. If you are on the new website and want to get into 5 Star, you will be asked to log in when 5 Star pops up, and you will be using your old ID number and old password. You can get it and submit items for approval. As I said, National has quite away to still go with this.

WOMEN"S HISTORY, Mary Boyd & Bobbi White Women Who Changed The World

Rachel Carson May 27, 1907 - April 14, 1964.Rachel Carson was a marine biologist, author, and conservationist considered to be one of the pioneers of modern environmentalism.

Born in 1907 on a farm in the rural Pennsylvania town of Springdale, Rachel Carson fed her love of nature early in life by exploring the forests and streams of her hometown. After a brief stint as an English student at Pennsylvania College for Women, she switched her focus to biology and eventually earned her Master's Degree in Zoology at Johns Hopkins University.



After being hired by the USA Fish and Wildlife Service in 1935 (a feat in itself for a woman in science) to write seven-minute radio spots about marine life entitled 'A Romance Under The Waters." She next published several articles on the wonder of nature and a person's place in it. Her poetic, yet scientifically enlightening style, was revealed in her first book *Under The Sea Wind* in 1941 and more famously in "The Sea



Around Us" in 1952. The latter placed her on the New York Times Bestseller List and won her the coveted National Book Award.

In 1962, Rachel Carson published probably her best known work, the controversial book, *The Silent Spring*, which exposed the public to the dangers of pesticides used by the government and agricultural industries. The chemical industry and her opponents blasted her personally and professionally; however, the new concern over pesticides led her to a Congressional hearing in 1963 and a subsequent ban on the wide use of a

dangerous chemical, DDT.

Rachel Carson died in 1964 after a battle with breast cancer, but left in her wake an enduring awareness of environmentalism which had never been seen before in America.

What would she say about the state of today's environmental protections?
