Parisi and Kathy Kuntz, "Dane County and Climate Change" Getting Results: Dane County's Ambitious Climate Action Plan Dane County has taken numerous steps to green its internal operations, saving money and reducing emissions. Now, via the 2020 Dane County Climate Action Plan, Dane County is partnering with local governments, businesses and individuals to accelerate climate action across the county. Join County Executive Joe Parisi and Director of the Office of Energy & Climate Change, Kathy Kuntz, to learn more about how Dane County's ambitious climate action plan benefits businesses and residents.

Joe Parisi has called Dane County home his entire life. He sought out public service as

a way to give back to a community that has given so much to him. Joe was first elected as County Executive, the chief elected leader of Dane County, in 2011 after 6 years in the State Assembly and 8 years as Dane County Clerk. Joe's priority is to ensure that everyone in our community has access to the opportunity to succeed. He believes investing in people pays big dividends. Joe knows this can work because he experienced it. Now Joe believes it is his turn to give back to ensure that our children's generation has access to the same opportunities that were available to him. Joe and his wife, Erin Thornley Parisi, raised their two daughters on Madison's east side. With a population of more than 500,000 and an



annual county budget of \$600 million, Dane is Wisconsin's second largest county. Dane County has the highest private sector job and population growth in Wisconsin.



**Kathy Kuntz,** CC-P, is the Director of the Dane County Office of Energy & Climate Change in Madison, Wisconsin. Kathy has almost 30 years of experience implementing programs focused on resource efficiency and climate action. Prior to joining Dane County Kathy led Cool Choices, a nonprofit that worked with businesses and local governments and prior to that Kathy led Focus on Energy, Wisconsin's statewide energy efficiency and renewable energy program.

#### Important!! Please Reset your Password!!

National AAUW briefly closed their website and reopened it with major changes. Your email will now be your username (not your ID number). You will need to set up a new password. These are the steps to follow:

- Log in to National website <a href="https://www.aauw.org">https://www.aauw.org</a>
- A box will show up and say "Password Reset Required." Type in your email address.
- Go to bottom and click "Forgot your Password?"
- Then a new box "Reset your Password" shows up. Type in your email again
- Then click the big blue box that says "Reset your Password"
- A green notice will appear at top of page that says if this is a valid user email you will get an email from National for the reset and all is well.

This is **what should happen** and does for most people if you are lucky! However, if you do not get a password reset email back, send an email to memberinfo@email.aauw.org and ask for a password reset. It may take as long as 24 hours for it to finally come through.

You will not be able to renew your membership online unless you have reset your password.

#### SCHOLARSHIP NEWS, Liz Senseman

The first of our scholarship recipients have been selected! Each year a representative of our branch participates in the selection of **Outstanding Undergraduate Returning Adult Student Awards.** These are congratulatory awards for adult students who have overcome various hardships and are now graduating from UW Madison. We contribute to these awards with the interest generated by the **Swenson-Rosenbery** fund held at UW. This year there were 7 eligible candidates. Each student prepared a biographical essay, and along with a faculty recommendation, their transcript and a 30 minute interview the committee selected three students to each receive \$1000.00. (The remaining students received either \$500 or \$250).

The three award winners are:

**Danielle Tolzmann**, a 52 year woman who is graduating with a BS in Community and Nonprofit Leadership with certificates in Disability Rights & Services and in Public Policy. She is the mom of an autistic son and has been extensively involved with local organizations dealing with disabilities.

**Christine Gerbitz**, a 54 year old who is pursuing her passion for teaching, is currently student teaching at Midvale Elementary. She and her husband are ex-farmers, and then for many years she worked in banking while also devoting many hours to 4-H and to her church. Her son will be graduating with her this May.

**Carly Major** overcame chronic health and pain issues in pursuing her degree. Her dream is to open a healing center with a multidisciplinary team approaching health from a holistic model. She was instrumental in the decision by the UW to allow herself and other students who felt unsafe to continue with remote learning.

All seven of the candidates had to overcome the obstacles placed by the Covid pandemic, especially with remote learning, and all showed remarkable strength and determination in completing their degrees.



#### WOMEN"S HISTORY, Mary Boyd & Bobbi White



Gloria Steinem. A social activist, writer, editor, lecturer, and feminist organizer, Gloria Steinem has been in the forefront of the women's rights movement since the late 1960s, campaigning passionately for social justice ever since.

Steinem was born in Toledo, Ohio and spent her early childhood traveling with her parents in a house trailer. From a young age, it was clear that she would not follow the traditional path expected of a woman at that time; settling down to marriage and having a family was not on her agenda. Instead, she studied government act Smith College in

#### Massachusetts

After completing her degree in 1956, she received a fellowship to study in India. Her time there ignited an interest in grassroots activism that would later inspire her work in the field of women's liberation and the passage of the Equal Rights Amendment (which is still pending)

On her return to the United States, Steinem carved out a career for herself as a freelance writer while becoming involved in the women's rights movement, leading marches and touring the country as a speaker where she found herself very much in demand.

In 1971 she founded the National Women;'s Political Caucus (NWPC) with Betty Friedan, Bella Abzug, and Shirley Chisholm. The organization continues today to promote gender equality and to ensure the election of more women to public office. She went on to launch the trailblazing Ms magazine which dealt with contemporary issues from a feminist perspective often unafraid to tackle difficult subjects such as domestic violence.

An acclaimed journalist and award winning author, Steinem wrote extensively about women's issues in books and essays that have always garnered attention and sometimes controversy. Steinem was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2013 and was an honorary co-chair and speaker at the Women's March on Washington, the day after the inauguration of Donald Trump. Her words continue to empower and inspire.

Today at age 87, Gloria Steinem is fully aware that both her work and the country's work remain unfinished.
