7 p.m. Program: "Indigenous Journalism: Changing the Narrative about First Americans" presented by Karen Lincoln Michel (Ho-Chunk Nation). Karen Lincoln Michel is a pioneering journalist dedicated to helping Native American communities tell their own stories and reflect Indigenous viewpoints. She is currently president and CEO of IndiJ Public Media, a nonprofit organization that owns ICT, formerly Indian Country Today, headquartered in Phoenix, AZ. ICT covers the Indigenous world through a daily digital platform and a



weekday newscast with international viewership. Karen joined in 2020 after serving five years as the editor and publisher of Madison Magazine.

Karen took over ICT's business operations just two months before the 2020 pandemic shut down the nation in March. ICT made the bold decision to launch a daily newscast to ensure that Indigenous communities learned how the coronavirus affected Native populations. "ICT Newscast with Aliyah Chavez" (https://indiancountrytoday.com/newscasts) is now carried on 39 public television stations and an additional 195 partner stations of the Boston-based World channel. It is produced at the Walter Cronkite School of Journalism and Mass Communication at Arizona State University, where Arizona PBS is the presenting station.

Karen was born into a close-knit family of the Ho-Chunk Nation growing up in the Ho-Chunk community of Tomah and graduating from Tomah High School with regular travel to relatives of the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska reservation.

NATIONAL BYLAWS VOTE, Kleo Baruth Kritz

This year the National AAUW Governance Committee and Board of Directors are recommending the adoption of updated bylaws to align AAUW's bylaws with current governance practices and principles related to board operations and to streamline the structure of the bylaws. These are some of these changes:

- 1 Revising the wording describing AAUW's charitable purpose
- 2 Moving the start of board terms from July 1 to the day following election.
- 3 Having board officers elected by the board, not the membership.
- 4 Limiting the Board Chair term to 2 years, with the possibility of a second term as Chair, only in a second term on the board.

This is basically a cleanup of the bylaws and there is nothing controversial being proposed. If you want to look over the proposed changes on the National website, go to https://www.aauw.org/resources/member/governance-tools/national-election/2023-aauw-bylaws-proposed-changes/

Please **VOTE** on these proposed bylaw changes when you receive an email this spring from National. Approval of changes to the bylaws requires a vote of the AAUW membership and those changes must be approved by 2/3rds of those members voting.

WOMEN'S HISTORY, Bobbi White & Mary Boyd

Grace Hopper, December 9, 1906 - January 1, 1992

Known as 'Amazing Grace" and the first lady of software, pioneering computer programmer Grace Hopper is best remembered for helping to create the first allelectronic digital computer, UNIVAC (Universal Automatic Computer).

Hopper was born in New York and attended Vassar College. She graduated in 1928 with a mathematics degree and then received master's and doctorate degrees in mathematics and physics from Yale University in 1934

During WWII at the age of 37 she enlisted with the Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service (WAVES). She trained at the Naval Midshipmen's School at Smith College in Northampton, Massachusetts and graduated at the top of her class in 1944. From there she was assigned to the Bureau of Ships Computation Project at Harvard University as a lieutenant, jg.

It was as an employee of Eckert Mauchly Computer Corporation that Hopper undertook pioneering work in compiling mathematics code into a language. Her assistance in developing the first computer compiler and the first computer programming language (COBOL) helped to revolutionize the world of computers.

Due to her invaluable knowledge, at the age of 60 she was recalled to active duty with the Navy to tackle standardizing communication between different computer languages. She remained there for 19 years, retiring as an admiral at the age of 79. In addition to her programming accomplishments, Hopper's legacy includes encouraging young women to learn how to program.

The "GRACE HOPPER CELEBRATION" is the world's largest technical conference for women in computing, and her legacy continues to serve as a role model and inspiration to women working in a variety of science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) today. Vocational, Technical, and Adult Education for more than eight years.

Women: A Gifted Heritage featuring 90 short biographies of women from all parts of the state in many different fields of endeavor, the book is a panorama of Wisconsin women spanning three centuries. Its pages open with Winnebago chieftess Glory of the morning and close with

Olympic champion medalist Beth Heiden. A committee of eighteen AAUW members spearheaded the project with members across the state writing the biographies. AAUW GENERAL MEETING MINUTES, JANUARY 24, 2023 Zoom Meeting

Speaker: Frances Huntley-Cooper spoke on "Thinking Locally: My Experience as the First African American Mayor in Wisconsin, Plus Public Service to Dane County and the State of Wisconsin." Co-president Kleo Baruth Kritz welcomed 41 members on Zoom screens to hear the speaker. Branches invited were Beaver Dam, Fort Atkinson, Janesville, and Tomah (with 11 Tomah members on one zoom screen) plus the AAUW State Board with members from Northwoods, Milwaukee, and West Suburban-Milwaukee.

Call to Order: Co-president Sally Keyel opened meeting at 8:02 p.m.

Special acknowledgment of Jan Robertson: Kleo revealed that the *Lil' Badger*, which

just came out from State, included a "Blast from the Past!" article written by Jan about a book *Wisconsin Women: a Gifted Heritage*, which was a project of the 1982 Wisconsin AAUW when Jan was the State Treasurer. The book includes 90 short biographies of women from all parts of the state spanning three centuries, and the biographies were written by AAUW members throughout the state.

Minutes from November 2022 printed in *Scope* newsletter approved as written.

Committee Updates:

Financial Report, Gail Stirr: Financial report sent earlier to membership. Balance as of Jan. 24: \$11,791.34. Note: Holiday auctions raised \$1,649.00 on Dec. 31.

- Mary Zupanc talked about a study done on health care disparities on four groups: Native American tribes, Hmong, African Americans and Hispanics. She said you can't go in and say what you plan to do, but you need to listen to the people in regard to their culture, religion, etc. and work with the community to come up with a project that will work for them. She offered to discuss neurology research, on healthcare disparities like this in the future.
- Lynn Celley told about the 9-year-old niece of her daughter in Minnesota. The school is offering opportunities for students to befriend disabled/less fortunate students with a few activities during the day and an outside activity like going holiday shopping. The little girl is so excited to be able to do this.

STEM, Donna Anderson:

New Business

National Bylaws: Mary Zupanc, a member of the National AAUW board in Public Health Care Policy, has been a long time member of National and this is the first year she has had the time to belong to a branch.

- National is proposing this year to streamline bylaws to be in accord with other non-profits and to reflect modern organization. There is nothing controversial, just a cleanup of the bylaws. Comment period is now open on the National website.
- Please VOTE on National bylaws. A 2/3 vote is needed for it to pass.
- Next year an open membership vote is scheduled that would eliminate the education requirement to increase diversity, equity and inclusion. Mary suggested a forum to discuss it and newsletter articles.
- Next National Board meeting is in mid-February and Mary will report back to our branch.
