WOMEN"S HISTORY, Mary Boyd & Bobbi White



Women have been present in the creation and production of music since the very beginning. In fact, the first female composer (or at least, the first female composer remembered by the history books) is Kassiani, an eighth-century nun who composed Byzantine chants. Her music, hauntingly beautiful, is still played today.

Whether they're given their proper dues or not, women have been shaping and changing the industry, the public's tastes, and popular styles for thousands of years. Unfortunately, they're just rarely given the same accolades and recognition as their male counterparts.

Ella Fitzgerald was the most popular female jazz singer in America for more than half a century. In her lifetime, she won 13 Grammy Awards and sold over 40 million albums. Her voice was flexible, wide-ranging, accurate and ageless. She could sing sultry ballads, sweet jazz and imitate every instrument in an orchestra.

She worked with all the jazz greats, from Duke Ellington, Count Basie and Nat King Cole, to Frank Sinatra, Dizzy Gillespie and Benny Goodman. She performed at top venues all over the world, and packed venues. Her audiences were as diverse as her vocal range. They were rich and poor, made up of all races, all religions and all nationalities. In fact, many of them had just one binding factor in common – they all loved her.

Ella was born in 1917. Her father, William, and mother, Temperance (Tempie), parted ways shortly to support the family. Joe dug ditches and was a part-time chauffeur, while Tempie worked at a laundromat and did some catering. Occasionally, Ella took on small jobs to contribute money as well. Ella worked as a runner for local gamblers, picking up their bets and dropping off money. She was more of a tomboy, and often joined in the neighborhood games of baseball. Ella was shy and self-conscious about her appearance. As an adult, she developed her famous 'SCAT' song format.

Ella felt very strongly about civil rights and required equal treatment for musicians, regardless of their color. She was inducted into the Down Beat magazine Hall of Fame, and received Kennedy Center Honors for her continuing contributions to the arts. In 1987, United States President Ronald Reagan awarded Ella the National Medal of Arts. It was one of her most prized moments. France followed suit several years later, presenting her with their Commander of Arts and Letters award, while Yale, Dartmouth and several other universities bestowed Ella with honorary doctorates.

- Scholarships for Monona Grove and La Follette high schools are announced in a May 17 awards ceremony and Liz will represent our branch.

• This year the committee originated names and supported speakers with diverse voices (see **Programs** report above) for Jan-March speakers. Additionally, October's speaker Leslie Petty shared her experiences as an African American woman moving as a dean at the UW Business School to Madison College in order

- to help students, including African Americans, find the tools to achieve their dreams. She is now working her second year with NCCWSL committee (see below).
- An "Aha" moment from **Shiela Reaves:** In her work with Native American journalists, she noticed that one Native value most often invoked for her was "respect," which is a kind of currency in communicating to and among Native journalists (and also emphasized by tonight's Ho-Chunk speaker, Karen Lincoln Michel). Shiela's "Aha moment" came when award-winning journalist Tony Lone Fight, a member of the Three Affiliated Tribes in central North Dakota, once exclaimed that all minority journalists he knew really wanted one thing: to be *respected!* Tony mentioned how respect requires trust and listening skills on the part of mainstream journalists and editors. Respect can build trust among minority journalists regardless of culture or race.

STEM, Donna Anderson: Janesville and Fort Atkinson will have their Tech Savvy on Saturday, April 15, at UW-Whitewater.

University Relations, Bobbi White: Bobbi reported there is interest in a small group of UW-Madison women and M/M Branch members to form an alliance to help UW students. Additionally another partnership could form in Bobbi's neighborhood to help a 12-year-old baker raise money for disabled students in her school to go to camp.
