of Doyenne. "Changing the Face of the Entrepreneurial Ecosystem

Overview: Doyenne was founded because we were tired of only seeing 20-something white guys who coded something in their dorm rooms highlighted as successful entrepreneurs across media and entrepreneurial spaces. In our 10 years of operation, we have continued to crash the wrecking ball through the current structures and systems in place as to how entrepreneurship is measured, how to best support scalable ventures and the entrepreneurs that



lead them, and make sure there's space for all who want to be part of the new entrepreneur ecosystem.

Women-led ventures continue to outperform their male counterparts in building ventures that require less initial funding and higher profits and investment returns, yet their stories are untold and access to resources continues to be a hurdle in getting these ventures to their full potential. During Heather Wentler's presentation she'll discuss current trends, changes within entrepreneurial ecosystems over the past decade, and how you - no matter your background - can join the Doyenne movement in advancing women and marginalized gender-led ventures to secure the support they need in order to create a more gender-equitable entrepreneurial ecosystem in Wisconsin and across the nation. Bio: Heather Wentler is an advocate for individuals who identify as female and/or non-binary to be recognized as strong, independent individuals capable of success. Professionally trained as an educator and having taught for 5 years in Madison, WI, Heather pivoted into entrepreneurship as a way to connect with and advocate for those whose voices are not recognized in ways she couldn't in the traditional classroom. Heather is the Executive Director & Co-founder of Doyenne and has also founded two local community-based ventures, Fractal and Madison SOUP.

Heather has won multiple local awards and has been publicly recognized for entrepreneurship and the work she does in the community. She serves on various committees and Advisory Boards from across Wisconsin to make sure gender equity and inclusion is a top priority for organizations and conferences focusing on entrepreneurship.

## AAUW Wisconsin Women Pay It Forward, Maggie Winz, State President

AAUW (American Association of University Women) has a long history advancing education for women and Wisconsin continues to raise and sponsor over \$200,000 per year in scholarship monies.

AAUW's story began in 1881, when a small group of female college graduates banded together to open the doors for women's career advancement and to encourage more women to pursue higher education. It was founded through the efforts of Marion Talbot and Ellen Swallow Richards.

AAUW's founding marked one of the first organized efforts to advance opportunities for women to pursue higher education and careers – equal with men. The early years offered women a way to unite as a source of strength, support and power. To that end, AAUW launched one of the most enduring fellowship programs for women in the world and commissioned ground-breaking research that documented women's abilities and value, hence gender equity. The first fellowship (\$350) was awarded in 1888 to Ida Street, a pioneer in the field of early American Indian history.

AUW Wisconsin started in 1921. In keeping with this tradition, AAUW-WI continues to make significant contributions to both NCCWSL (National Collegiate Conference for Women Student Leaders) and Higher Education Scholarships with over \$210,000 given by collective Branches. AAUW-WI also allocates \$5000 per year for NCCWSL scholarships with contributions from 3 State Branches.

Over half of AAUW-WI 22 Branches have nominated students for the State NCCWSL scholarships, and funded local scholarship recipients. Fifteen percent allocated funds to assist with travel. In terms of Higher Education Scholarships, 3/4 of Branches provide scholarships to students attending both technical colleges and 4-year colleges and universities.

Moving forward AAUW-WI and Branches plan to continue their efforts to foster equity in education and opportunity for women and girls, playing a vital role in enhancing the lives and future of all. ## SCHOLARSHIP NEWS, Liz Senseman

It is scholarship season! Both Monona Grove and La Follette High Schools are in the process of selecting this years recipients. We award a \$1000.00 scholarship to a student at each school, this year the La Follette award will be the final one in honor of Atsuko Kusuda who was a long time member of AAUW and in whose name a fund was set up in her honor. The award ceremonies are on May 17th, and following that I will send out more information about the young women who received these awards.

Meanwhile the recipients of our scholarships and awards at UW Madison have been selected. We contribute (through the Swenson-Rosenberry Fund) to **Outstanding Undergraduate Returning Adult Student Awards,** which are for students graduating this year. These awards are a recognition of their achievements - this year there were 11 candidates, this pool was narrowed down to 5 (after reviewing student statements, transcripts and faculty nominations) and then the 2 finalists were selected following interviews which were held recently. We participate in this selection process along with four faculty members. The 6 first-round nominees each receive \$100, the 3 semi-finalists each receive \$500, and the 2 finalists each receive \$1000. The two top awards this year went to **Robert Hall** and **Christine Fifarek.** 

The **Single Parent Undergraduate Scholarship** is for \$2000.00. We do not directly participate in the selection of this recipient, the Division of Continuing Studies at UW receives and reviews the applications for this award. This year the recipient is **Sanna Kelly** and a thank you note from her is included below. (Interestingly, our recipient last year was a semi finalist for the OURAS award this year.)

The ceremony recognizing these students will be held this year on April 26. Hopefully we will be able to meet our recipients, and photos and more biographical information will be available for our next newsletter.

**Bio:** Sanne was born in Switzerland and moved from Holland to the U.S. when she was 5. She lived in Wisconsin during middle school and was very active in sports, clubs, and was a very good student. After moving the Maryland, it was difficult to adjust and it triggered a major depressive episode, but she remained a good student and active in soccer and French club. She traveled the world and became a yoga teacher and performer, and has inspired many people on their spiritual and healing journeys. She is a devoted teacher and friend to many people, and mother of one. She is an A student at UW Madison, which she has worked very hard to get to.

**Thank you note**: I am so grateful for the scholarship Nontraditional, Adult, & Single Parents - American Association of University Women (AAUW). As a single working mom and student it can be very difficult to meet all of the demands of life, and support like this makes it possible to pay for the myriad of things associated with ongoing school and commuting from the rural town I live in. My goal is to become a nurse so I can help

as many people as I can and be a positive influence on the health of my patients. Having grown up in Wisconsin I always wanted to attend UW and it took me a while to get here, but have worked very hard; and will continue to do so until I reach new heights.
