#### NATIONAL BYLAWS VOTE, Kleo Baruth Kritz

Open Up AAUW: AAUW Bylaws Election 2024

This spring AAUW members will be asked to vote on an amendment to the national bylaws recommended by the AAUW Board of Directors and AAUW Governance Committee that would open membership to any individual who supports AAUW's important mission of advancing equity for women and girls.

Key Dates for 2024 Vote

April 3, 2024 Voting opens (online voting is encouraged)

May 15, 2024 Online voting ends at 12:00 pm ET

May 16, 2024 Vote results announced online

Overview and Reasons for the Proposed Amendment

The AAUW Board of Directors and Governance Committee recommend approval of the following bylaw amendment to eliminate the degree requirement for membership in AAUW. This change will align our membership practices with our purpose of advancing equity for women and girls and enable us to include members with the diverse backgrounds and perspectives needed to achieve our purpose in today's world. We remain committed to higher education as a pathway to eliminate barriers that hold women back and to enhance their leadership opportunities at all levels. We admire the effort of the inspiring women who have led the way in earning their degrees. We recognize, however, that in today's world higher education degrees are one of several paths needed to advance equity for women and girls. Professional certifications, on the job training, career technical experience, and life experience are alternative paths to obtaining education and the skills needed to become leaders and advocates for ending discrimination against women.

When AAUW began its work, higher education and professional careers were denied to most women. That is no longer the case. More than 50% of college degrees are currently being awarded to women, and women are now attaining powerful positions in business and government. Yet discrimination against women continues. Eliminating the degree requirement enables us to expand our voice and our reach, our ability to fulfill our purpose, and will open more financial opportunities to address the needs of all women. AAUW's name, which continues to have significant brand recognition as a women's rights organization, will remain the same if the amendment is adopted. The board recognizes that some members have strong views on the proposed change in the requirement for membership and encourages respectful debate on this important issue.

The board firmly believes that the proposed amendment is in the best interests of AAUW and its future relevance and sustainability as an inclusive and forward-thinking organization committed to advancing equity for women and girls. The board urges a vote in favor of the amendment.

**Amendment Summary** 

The Proposed Revision of Article III Would:

- Replace the Individual Members paragraph of the Membership Qualification provision with new language indicating the sole requirement for membership is support of AAUW's purpose.
- Delete the provision on Student Associates since college students would be allowed to join as full members of AAUW thus eliminating the need for a Student Associate provision.
- Delete the reference to "categories of membership" to permit the board to set different dues for college student members as previously allowed when Student Associates were listed as a separate category.

When and how do I vote?

All voting will take place online starting April 3. AAUW is utilizing an independent, third-

party voting system for this year's vote. Most members will receive emails from vote@simplyvoting.com with their unique elector ID and password to vote. This information will be emailed to members before voting begins (and voters will receive regular reminders if they have not yet voted).

All members without an email address on file or who have unsubscribed from AAUW national emails will receive a paper ballot by mail. No additional paper ballots will be sent

during the voting period.

How many votes are needed for the changes to pass?

The AAUW bylaws require that the affirmative (yes) vote of two-thirds of the votes cast are required to amend the bylaw

### WOMEN'S HISTORY, Bobbi White & Susan Slattery Fun Facts to know about Florence Nightingale



**Florence Nightingale**, a British Nurse, notably known for her incredible impact on the nursing profession., is remembered and celebrated for her great achievements year-round. Although Nightingale has done so much throughout her life, a lot of people do not know much about her.

There are a few fun facts you should know about her.

Her family did not want her to be a nurse. When Florence was 16, she knew nursing was her true calling, but her parents were against it. It was expected that someone of her social stature would marry and raise a family. Going against the wishes of her family, she refused to get married at age 17 and continued her nursing education in Germany.

**Florence had a natural skill for analyzing data.** Analyzing, classifying, and documenting data was a skill that naturally came to Florence. She created the first pie charts and eventually became the first

female of the Royal Statistical Society due to her pioneering work.

**She loved to write.** Nightingale had a passion for writing and wrote more than 150 books, including "Notes on Hospital" and "Notes on Nursing", which laid the foundations for modern nursing practice. Much of her writing was influenced by her feminist identity.

**She played a significant role during the Crimean War**. Florence worked as a nurse during the Crimean War helping wounded soldiers. At first, the doctors didn't want her and the other nurses to help, even though they were swamped. They saw Nightingale's opinions on patient care as an attack on their professionalism. It wasn't until the doctors became overwhelmed with the number of bodies did they ask Florence and the other nurses for assistance. They were able to greatly improve medical and sanitary conditions in the hospitals and improve outcomes for the wounded soldiers.

**Lady with the Lamp.** During her work in the Crimean War, Florence would nurse soldiers at night. She would carry a lamp with her during rounds which would lead to her nickname, "Lady of the Lamp". She grew to be a person of fame as people were captivated by her dedication.

**She spoke many languages.** Florence was fluent in several languages, including English, French, German, and Italian as well as Greek and Latin.

**Founder of modern nursing.** Nightingale is referred to as the founder of modern nursing.

She proposed ways of improving sanitation, the foundation of modern medicine. During the war Nightingale, the need for improved sanitation and her efforts made a huge difference in the hospitals throughout England as well. This enabled more women to join the nursing profession with her advocating for education to elevate the nursing profession.

**She loved to travel.** Traveling the world was a passion for Florence. She loved to gain insight and knowledge about the practice of medicine.

**A training school for nurses was established in her honor.** In 1860, Nightingale founded the first nursing school in London. There the Nightingale Training School for Nurses was established.

Florence is still honored to this day. We celebrate International Nurses Day every year on May 12<sup>th</sup> but every day her legacy lives on! Before her impact, nursing was not considered a respectable profession. To this day, Nightingale has been remembered as the pioneer of modern medicine nursing and every day she continues to inspire future nurses.

As a nurse for the past 53 years, I am very grateful to Florence for paving the way for all the nurses whole followed behind her!!

#### AAUW GENERAL MEETING MINUTES, January 23, 2024 via zoom

**Program: 7:00** Francine Hirsch, PhD., Vilas Distinguished Achievement Professor of History, UW-Madison, spoke on "Russia's War on Ukraine" on Zoom with 19 Monona/Madison members present and 13 from Janesville AAUW, one from the State Board, and one unknown.

The virtual meeting was called to order by Co-President Sally Keyel at 8:02 pm.

**National Membership Voting:** Carole Salinas, State Leadership VP, discussed the reasons for AAUW bringing this issue of eliminating the education requirement to the membership to vote on again relatively soon. The percentage of voters was low last time, only about 29% of the total membership voting. We need 2/3 of the members who vote to change this rule, and 61% did vote for it last time.

The major reasons to make a change and include anyone who agrees with our mission to advance opportunities for girls and women include:

- We are missing out on a great deal of potential corporate funding because we appear "elitist."
- One doesn't need a degree to support gender equity.
- We currently allow 2 year degree recipients to join as well as men.
- Making this change could increase our membership as well as generate outside funding opportunities to help us do our work better.
- If we stress diversity, equity, and inclusion, how do we justify discriminating against women who believe in our mission but did not have the opportunities we did?

Carole told the story of giving this information to a couple members who were opposed to the change but changed their minds after learning more of these details. We hope to evolve similarly to the YMCA/YWCA, etc. (You do not have to be young, male, or Christian to join YMCA.) Many organizations no longer have the restrictions that they initially required in their names--that is the way of the future in this increasingly diverse world.

You will receive emails from National encouraging you to vote and explaining why. Go to "Simply Voting" which is a third party company that manages web voting for organizations. The official name of our organization will remain "AAUW," but the letters no longer stand for anything in particular - it is just recognizable letters. Please vote! Vote Yes to make this important change.

**December Minutes:** The December minutes were printed in the *Scope* and accepted as is without any corrections.

**Finance Report:** Gail Stirr reported that absolutely nothing happened and we still have a balance of \$9763.91 in the bank. Gail also reported that anyone who knows anything about websites would be most welcome to help her with keeping ours organized, up to

date, and more elegantly designed.

**Programs:** Donna Anderson reported that the committee will be meeting in late Feb./early March to gather ideas for our 2024-2025 programs. The committee would like suggestions, feedback, and additional members.

**Membership:** Nothing significant occurred. Kleo Baruth Kritz noted that she had a call from Maple Bluff Country Club that things were already being booked for the holidays, so she confirmed that we want to reserve the same rooms for December 7, 2024.

**Nominating Committee:** Sharon Knoop reported that this committee is ready to make phone calls to members to request their help in filling an office. Job descriptions are on the website. We have made things a bit easier by having Co-Chairs for several positions. Volunteers are greatly appreciated! Please contact Sharon, Kleo or Marian Ehrenberg if you are willing to serve in any capacity.

**Public Policy:** Debbie Mahaffey reported that she is unable to attend the State meetings due to a time conflict on the first Monday of the month. If anyone has that time available and is able to help her, it would be much appreciated. She knows that a State resolution on anti-racism has been updated; National has a toolkit for DEI that will be available on Jan. 31 and has information on educational policies, book banning, and school vouchers.

The League of Women Voters is seeking volunteers to be election observers (people who watch on the sidelines to insure voting is done correctly).

**Educational Funds:** No report.

**STEM/NCCWSL:** Donna reported that we are funding the entry fee of \$15.00 for 7 girls to participate in the Tech Savvy program at UW-Whitewater and 3 of our members have volunteered to help with the program.

In regard to NCCWSL it has been challenging to make the correct contacts with both Madison College and the UW-Madison to help identify young women who would be good candidates to send to NCCWSL.

**Publicity:** Pat Ruppert was supposed to give the report, but she was hospitalized for emergency surgery. Mary had nothing to report.

**Diversity, Equity & Inclusion:** Nothing new to report.

**Fundraising:** Two groups are going to "Diane's Delicious Diner" at Madison College East Campus prepared by their culinary students on Feb. 15 and April 4. Lunch starts at noon and finishes at 1:30 pm. The cost is \$25.00 for lunch plus \$15.00 for fundraising (total \$40.00). Please contact Val Murphy to sign up.

**Newsletter:** The deadline for the next newsletter is February 7.

**University Relations:** No report.

**New Business:** Kleo is heavily involved in planning the next State Convention which will take place in Racine on April 26 & 27 entitled "Architects of the Future." Kleo reminded us of all the things AAUW has helped women achieve over the years. She is

excited by the low cost of the hotel (\$100.57 per night including taxes); the tour of the S.C. Johnson Building; the excellent speakers coming; and the fascinating topics in the small breakout sessions. Our branch will contribute \$10.00 toward the registration fee (undetermined at this point) for members who wish to attend.

**Emergency Contacts:** Kleo again urged members to provide an emergency contact person who is likely to know where a member has moved to or if they are ill or hospitalized when the member doesn't respond to phone calls.
