SCHOLARSHIPS, Liz Senseman

Scholarship News: We have four scholarship funds at U.W. Madison - in the spring awards were made from our Fund for Excellence and the Swenson-Rosenberry Fund. In addition, we have two much older endowed funds which are managed by the U.W. Foundation. The Elizabeth Warner Risser Fellowship in Communication Arts was awarded to two graduate female students, Liwei Shen and Shreya Singh. Liwei is working toward her doctorate in the field of communication science. She studies cognitive and relationship dynamics of communication, revealing the ways in which we are persuaded by others as well as ways in which we spread information. Shreya is studying rhetoric, politics and culture with an emphasis on the intersections of Indian nationalism, neocolonialism and transnational feminism. The awards made from this

fund generally go towards providing "extras" for these students, in the form of travel assistance for conferences and other events that assist them in their PhD pursuits. The other fund is the **Martha L. Edwards History Scholarship for Women**, which is given to a graduate student in the History Department. We have not received information recently about the recipients of this award, but we are working on obtaining more information - stay tuned! The dollar amounts allocated as spendable in each of these two funds is approximately \$1000, dependent on interest earned, and is split between the recipients if there is more than one selected.

Jenny Beatty

I was born and mostly raised in Madison, and left town after graduating from UW in 1985. After 28 years living in other parts of the U.S., I returned to Madison to help my aging parents. My career has been as a professional pilot, including 33 years as an airline pilot. There were about 2% women airline pilots in the U.S. when I started, and in those three decades it's increased to 5% today. Throughout my flying career, I have worked to promote pilot careers to women and

to help women in these careers through research, writing, mentoring, scholarships, and advocacy. Now I am returning to college to formally study scientific research methods, with the goal of doing more research of women in professional pilot professions. I am joining AAUW to be part of a community that supports women in their educational goals.

Jessica Calarco

I'm a Professor of Sociology at the <u>University of Wisconsin-Madison</u>, an award-winning teacher, a leading expert on inequalities in family life and education, and the author or coauthor of four books, including most recently <u>Holding it Together: How Women Became America's Social Safety Net</u>, which was published in June 2024. Drawing on more than five years of research, the book reveals how women have come to bear the brunt of our broken system, what the weight of that responsibility is doing to women, and why so many Americans believe the myths that delude us into believing that we don't need a social safety net and divide us by race, class,



gender, religion, and politics in ways that keep us from coming together to demand the

support we all need and deserve. The book has received praise from Melinda French Gates, Ai-Jen Poo, Tressie McMillan Cottom, Anne Helen Petersen, Jennifer Breheny Wallace, and Anne-Marie Slaughter; has been featured on NPR's On Point and It's Been a Minute; and has been reviewed in the Atlantic, the New York Times, and Kirkus Reviews. When I'm not writing books, I'm often writing on social media or writing opeds for outlets like the *New York Times*, the *Washington Post*, the *Atlantic*, and CNN. And when I'm not writing, you can usually find me trail running or on the sidelines at my kids' soccer games
